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RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. QUALIFICATIONS / CATEGORIES

Boys and girls of Yavapai County may exhibit entries in this division if they are age 7-19 as of the first day of the fair. Ages 2-6 may exhibit in Tiny Tots Department, and Adults are welcome to enter in other departments. All entries must have been made during the past year. The entrant must make all entries (except collections). Teachers may not enter class projects within this department or enter items on behalf of their students -- it is reserved for individual entrants.

A MAXIMUM OF SIX (6) ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED FROM EACH ENTRANT.

Boys and Girls ages 7-12 are CLASS A

Boys and Girls ages 13-19 are CLASS B

2. ENTRY FORM(S) / FEES

Use the General Entry Form on page 7. ENTRY BLANKS MUST BE COMPLETED AND RECEIVED BY FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 2010. Send entry blanks to Sandra deVos, Dept. To make things go faster at check-in, please pick up and prepare YELLOW ENTRY TAGS from the fair office prior to entry day. STATE THE AGE OF ENTRANT ON ALL YELLOW TAGS IN UPPER RIGHT CORNER.

ONLY ONE ARTICLE ENTERED PER LOT NUMBER. Similar items cannot be entered as "any other."

3. ENTRY DATES & PROCEDURES

Exhibits will be received on the third floor of the grandstand on Tuesday, September 28, 2010, from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. **NOTE TIME CHANGE!** Each exhibitor will be entitled to ONE fair entry pass regardless of how many entries the person has.

4. DISPLAY RULES

Articles will not be accepted or judged if soiled or stained. All exhibits must be finished products and ready to display. Insect collections must have DEAD bugs.

5. JUDGING & PREMIUMS / VOUCHERS

The Danish system of judging will be used. Each entry will be judged on its own merit rather than in competition. This is why it is important to put **YOUR AGE IN THE UPPER RIGHT CORNER AND HANDICAP EXPLANATION (IF ANY) IN UPPER LEFT CORNER OF YELLOW TAGS.**

Vouchers will be ready when a sign is posted in the Junior Home Economic room on the 3rd floor. Vouchers must be picked up no later than 3:00 p.m. and cashed no later than 5:30 p.m. on Sun., Oct. 3. **NO CHECKS WILL BE MAILED.**
